ACT Government Minister Mick Gentleman arrived in his MG C and offered his services as a judge of one of the trophies on offer.


Our editor, Helen, was looking for a defibrillator after a hot rod vehicle started its engine behind her and frightened the life out of her.

CLUB RUN SATURDAY 22 APRIL 2017

This is the latter 1883 sandstone extension to Gungahlin Homestead. CSIRO are the current landlords of the Homestead, its outbuildings and the complex between the Barton Highway and Bellenden Road.

Soldier On, which supports men and women who have been physically or psychologically affected by their military service, currently use the premise. The buildings cannot be visited or viewed close up.

The staircase below gives you an idea of the interior of the homestead.





Gungahlin is associated with large landholders, known as 'squires', and their families. They were influential in the local community in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Squires included William Davis, who built the original homestead, which he named 'Goongarline', and Edward Crace, who built the addition that made the homestead into a grand English style residence, known as 'Gungahleen'.

With its original buildings, rear courtyard, garden areas, carriage loop, miniature lake and driveway, the Homestead site

forms a cultural landscape which is evidence of the desire of the residents of that era to re-create an English park-like style.

Did you know there is an 1865 late-Georgian residence in Crace? Opened to the public for the first time, the National Trust's annual Open Day will have its full range of fun activities, displays and tours of the Gungahlin Homestead. Co-hosted with Soldier On who will showcase the valuable work they do.

Directions: Turn off the Barton Highway into Bellenden Street. No 44. Gold coin donation.

1930 HUPMOBILE "S" SEDAN

The previous owner of this car is the late Tim Fishburn who passed away on 14 January 2016 following a courageous effort fighting pancreatic cancer.

Tim and I had been friends for some time and recently I recalled when he was the maverick at our Dodge Four chin wag twenty-plus years ago. Maverick because Tim was the only non-Dodge owner and while most of us shop-car-talked he took charge of the kitchen duties. Following the funeral I had a call from Tim's son Joe who lives in Melbourne and what he said was a total shock - Tim had left his Hupmobile to me. I thanked Tim but replied to Joe that I do not want it. His reply was that Tim was quite adamant about his decision and, if I wish, I should feel free to sell it any time. If I take it, I said, I would not part with it. My vintage fleet now comprises a Dodge and (almost) two Hupmobiles.

The estate agent was yelping at me to move the Hup from Tim's house and as it had been sitting on car stands I took the opportunity to remove the wheels and inflate the tyres with the expectation that the tubes would not retain air pressure. That afternoon I was happily proven wrong and the next morning they were back in their place. Quite an achievement, I thought, for half a century old tyre rubber but unfortunately unfit for safe road use. With family assistance the car was on its way to a new home saddened by Tims' neighbours watching and waving as it passed by on the car trailer.

Tim was a master collector of everything and anything and the first step was to continue with culling the cabin of all unrelated hoardings. "Why have one when you can have fifty one" his ex wife Janice said in her eulogy. The second was to establish whether the mechanicals were in running order. Once this had been done I felt that the remaining repairs would not be a problem. I underline repairs as my intention was not to restore it but to rather only do the minimum requirements to return it to a road-registrable condition. Apart from missing some mechanicals, some interior trim and fittings and minor panel repairs, the car is in an original condition. Therefore I could not forgive myself if I was to destroy this authenticity.

In the process of buying a new six volt battery (all Hups are six volts) the helpful assistant at Battery World tested the coil and surprisingly it showed full power. An oil change followed and the engine was then free-spun to circulate the lubricant. The next morning I was horrified to see a puddle of engine oil under the car and visions of a major oil seal leak began to torture me. The cause was simple. Before cranking the engine, half a cup of motor oil was poured into each cylinder. During the cranking it flowed

through the exhaust valves settling inside the exhaust pipe near the rear of the oil sump and slowly seeped through a pinhole.

Next was to start the engine and as automotive electrics was never a strong point of mine I sought assistance from Phil Cancillier - a well-known retired mechanic and Speedway racer. Following intense fiddles with power and fuel the motor roared to life for the first time in over or close to fifty years burning a build-up of oil, WD40 and other foul smelling gunk. Anyone would be forgiven for fearing a house fire such was the extent of the exhaust smoke.

As I had problems starting my daily car the NRMA came to the home rescue. When the patrolman arrived he saw plumes of exhaust fumes bellowing behind the Hup. "I'll sort the Falcon out first then I'll have a look at that old jalopy" he said. What I had suspected he confirmed – fuel was entering the vacuum line choking the engine: the same problem that plagued the Dodge for numerous years. A leaking vacuum tank float bowl was the problem.

Doing my best in getting the lighting system working the way it should was driving me nuts therefore the car was taken to Battery World. For an auto electrician the solution is no big deal. The only problem Greg had was locating the six-volts headlight globes. While I was searching the internet I remembered the bag full I had bought earlier at a swap meet.

Anticipating a less stringent standard of Vehicle Registration Inspection only the bare essential repairs were done and believing the car was almost pretty much ready it was put to the test. The ACT Vehicle Inspectors, however, (five of them) went berserk and thoroughly fine-tooth combed it giving me a lengthy and incomplete failed inspection report. Accepting that the car will require full-on repairs, my ambition in having it ready by winter went out the window.

Following a three week break it was back to work to try and bring the car closer to the required level. This involved a superficial make-over to the interior and undercarriage (being careful not to overdo it) including fitting four new tyres, a new timber roof (replacing the chicken wire) and the temporary adaptation of the front seat borrowed from the Dodge. One of the failures was protruding seat springs.

On being told the car does not require inspection by the Motor Vehicle Registry it was taken to an authorised inspector in Mitchell. The only concern was the missing front brakes but apparently these were a factory option and therefore I thought little of it. During the inspection the cars' ID details "had dropped out of the system and will require a Vehicle ID check and inspection by us" the receptionist was told by the MVR. This is where the headaches began to escalate and as it was becoming an agonising experience I would like to share it with readers in a separate article.

A second inspection by the MVR in early October resulted in another failure. This time it was two minor faults plus I had to provide evidence of optional front brakes. The extensive world -wide search for a series S Hup brakes and information was still continuing but no one on this planet could assist. For some reason front brakes for this series are very scarce and, unfortunately, there are two others I know of that are in the same predicament – one in Frankston the other in New Zealand. Perhaps front brakes were in fact an option which could explain their rarity. However, on a happier note, a bloke in Kentucky (USA) has a running chassis complete with all the braking system – he thinks. This he will establish once the snow has melted sometime in April. In the meantime I was in a jam.

Among other areas the front axle and brakes are unique to this series. The basic layout of the brakes is the same as other Hups but differs in size, locations and bracketing and something - besides waiting in anticipation hoping a set will materialise - had to be done. Looking at the more common front axle on the 1929 Century Six got me thinking about improvisation. At this early stage, though, I was reluctant in cannibalising it not knowing whether the setup would even come close to fitting the S chassis. In the pile of spares was an axle with decomposing remains. This type of braking system used in 1920's and 30's Hups is called steeldraulic pioneered by Hupmobile and in the series S manufactured by Midland. The system uses a one piece leading and trailing brake shoe, flexible cabling and steel rods. A second cable and a drivers' side brake shoe were located at Flynns Wreckers in Cooma during a regular trip to the coast.

The experimental fun was now beginning. With hidden modifications to the brake drums, cables and axle and repairs to the other bits, the car had front brakes. This sounds straight forward but it was a nerve-wrecking and fastidious exercise exasperated by the fact it could amount to nothing.

A third inspection on December 16 resulted in two failures – play in king pin (which had been "repaired" earlier by a Belconnen butcher) and provide a weighbridge certificate. I knew the pin would fail but my biggest threat were the brakes. After all that anguish a front brake test was not done. No need - they were happy with the work.

1930 HUPMOBILE

This is a follow-up to my earlier article on the Story Of My Car.

It appears that office workers at Access Canberra, ACT Government shopfronts and the Motor Vehicle Registry have

limited knowledge of their duties. This is not only annoying but also frightening knowing that you may be unwittingly being mislead.

The following are some, not all, just some of the actual occurrences in the lead-up to the Hupmobile's Vehicle Registration Establishment -

April - advice from Access Canberra car requires roadworthy inspection by the MVR.

July - a second inspection this time by an authorised inspector after being told by the MVR the vehicle does not require their inspection. During inspection advice from the MVR that the car requires a vehicle identity check and their inspection.

August – unofficial advice from an employee of the MVR vehicle does not require MVR inspection.

September - while making appointment with Access Canberra for inspection and ID check, the female team leader was insistent chassis and engine numbers should contain more digits. Emailed confirmation from her showed different times and dates to the actual booking.

October - at the MVR questions asked why do I want an ID check. "I don't" I replied. "you guys do". The person in charge of Vintage regos at the MVR does not recall telling me or the authorised inspector an ID is required. The car was now blacklisted meaning only the MVR can re-inspect it.

December - inspection appointment made with Access Canberra. Emailed confirmation showed October dates.

December – at payment of rego female worker being difficult in accepting printed emailed transfer of car ownership from will executor.

It is quite obvious their credibility is questionable and anyone having the misfortune of dealing with them should be cautious. This is not the first time I had misunderstandings with all three and most likely will not be the last.


