

#### 1957 Bentley Mulliner Continental Fastback Rob Swain

I was lucky enough to grow up in my teens in the UK on a 100 acre farm, which was intensively cropped. I missed a lot of school in the summer with harvesting activities, driving a combine harvest (header) from 12 years old. Prior to this, my mother and father owned a dairy and were also very much involved in vintage vehicles. My father and mother both had a passion for vintage Bentleys. They owned, or should I say built 3 from spare parts. Of note, my mother's father and mother were John Bolster (Autosport cofounder, motoring journalist and builder of the "Bloody Mary") and Barbara Skinner. Barbara's father was Carl Skinner, the managing director of Skinners Union (SU) Carburettors.

My father's favourite commuting car was a pre-war Riley, named "Wobbily". The Bentleys were "Mr B" – an enclosed 4 ½ litre saloon with an early 1950's full body, Ajax, a heavy crank 4 ½ which had a very light aluminium and fibreglass body weighing under 40kg with only two seats, which my father built for my mother from spare parts to do hill climbs, and lastly Hercules – another 4 ½ that my father built with a green Vanden Plas styled bodywork and long mudguards with running boards. Our daily transport around the farm and to take me to school was a Willy's Jeep.

They also owned a Harley WLA 750 and a couple of Vincents.

After my mother left my father, he turned to arable farming and the Bentleys and motorcycles were sold to pay for shared costs. However shortly after the separation (early 1970's), my father found the Mulliner Continental (Conti). It was advertised at a very cheap price (about the same price as a Ford Cortina), mainly because of its history and a very poor respray. It was one of the only cars he had ever bought that was in working order (apart from a new 1971 Series 2A diesel Land Rover). The Conti previously was an everyday driver, in all weathers. My father wax oiled the underneath to prevent further corrosion. He used it on occasional Sundays for picnic trips.

By the early 1980's my step mother had developed Rheumatoid Arthritis and struggled to get in and out of vehicles. My father with his engineering knowledge built a seat that electrically raised and slid out sideways with a

180 degree pivot once past the door, so that the individual could be easily transferred to a disability scooter. He also engineered a towbar for the back to load a disability scooter.

From the early 1990's the car was rarely used (possibly twice a year) and by 2010 it had accumulated about 100 miles on the odometer.

My brother was fortunate enough to be live willed the farm and house over a 7 year period and in 2013 he wanted the shed the Conti was stored in to rent out for commercial activity. I was given the opportunity to acquire the vehicle from my father, rather than my brother having it removed and sold at auction.

I was given 2 days to have the car removed, so the challenges of organising a car to be internationally shipped were extremely challenging. The car arrived in Australia and hit a barrage of customs issues and costs, including \$750 to remove acorns from the back seat. At some point before the car was shipped, a squirrel had got through an open window and burrowed into the back seat to store its supply of acorns!

It eventually turned up on my doorstep in Canberra, however it would not fit in our garage. After getting turned down for planning permission on several occasions to change the garaging, we eventually bought a property out of town to store the amazing "Conti".

Some details about the car:

1957 Mulliner Bodied Continental

Aluminium Body (almost 600 KG's lighter than a Silver Cloud)

Chassis # BC14CH

- 4.9 straight six engine identical to a Rolls Royce Silver Cloud but with a much higher compression ratio
- 4 Speed automatic (3 speeds fingertip control)
- It's one of 16 RHD and 24 LHD Mulliner Fastback Continentals (there are only 15 RHD Mulliner Continentals left with two in Australia)
- The front brakes are not linked to the pedal, but are operated through a servo on the propshaft, as are the top shoes on the rear. Low speed manoeuvring with only bottom shoes is precarious.

Averages 15 MPG

The vehicle had 31,000 miles on the clock upon arrival – I have managed to cover 4,000 in 4 years



#### 2018 Battle of Waterloo - Queanbeyan Sunday 17th June

The "Battle of Waterloo" is organised by French and British marque clubs as close as possible to the anniversary of the 1815 Battle of Waterloo (18 June), at which Napoleon's armies were finally defeated by an alliance of British and German armies. In the local version, the "Battle" is decided non -violently by counting the numbers of vehicles that turn up on the day, British or French.

This year's Battle at Queanbeyan Park drew around a hundred vehicles, with a small majority of British cars claiming the victory. A rainy week and chilly winds on the day seem to have limited the numbers. Most participants had departed the field by midday, but the venue was a good one on the lawns under the trees, and participants and visitors had a good look at a range of interesting vehicles.

The British provided most of the heavy cavalry, in the form of Rolls, Jags, Armstrong Siddeleys and a Daimler (me), a small squadron of Triumphs and MGs, plus an extended flank of assorted Minis and a scattering of Morris Minors showing their usual perseverance. A bright red Jag XJS V12 contributed a threatening presence in the British reserve line, growling from time to time when poked by admirers.

A couple of tidy Renault 10s lurked in the back line, while a fine Citroen DS carried the flag assertively in the French front line. A shapely Citroen TA was seen arriving too late to affect the outcome of the battle. I was disappointed that no 2CVs had come out to support the Tricoleur, despite their famous durability.

The oldest veteran was a stately pre-war Vauxhall 4-cylinder in excellent condition. It was positioned on the far right flank of the British lines, where the French lines were closest. This might have been coincidence, but I was reminded that General Motors recently sold all their European brands, including British Vauxhall, to the French Peugeot corporation. Is Vauxhall now a French margue?

The Mayor of Queanbeyan, Tim Overall, turned up to award a personal choice prize (he chose a Bentley) and to demonstrate that Queanbeyan is keen to extend hospitality to car events that, these days, are finding ACT venues complex to negotiate.

Let's hope the weather is kinder to next year's Battle of Waterloo.


