

A Spanner in the works

Alice Anderson was the first women to open and operate an all women garage in Australia.

From 1919 to 1929 Alice hired women to undergo apprenticeships in vehicle mechanics, chauffeuring, and driver training and motor car touring. She built her own purpose built garage in Kew near Melbourne Victoria.

Her clients were both men and women mainly from the upper echelon of Melbourne society.

In 1927 with a friend she drove an Austin 7 from Melbourne to Alice Springs a trip only undertaken by one other person, Frances Birtles. The Austin 7 with its doors removed to make room for extra equipment made the journey without major incident. Alice sold the vehicle to an NT outback grazier in Alice Springs before returning to Melbourne.

Her employees, all women, doted and loved her, for her fair treatment of them. The girls lived on the premises and Alice looked after their welfare.

Three other garages were opened in the vicinity of the Kew garage, all owned and run by men, who accused Alice of butting into their business, although she was the first to open a garage in the area.

Alice died in mysterious circumstances following a gun shot at the garage in 1931.

Loretta Smith has spent some ten years researching the story of Alice Anderson and has written her life story in *A Spanner in the Works*, available at all good book stores. *Thanks to Graham Gittins*

BLUES TO BERRIMA-FEB 2020

The Berrima District Historic Club held its 44th Berrima Rally on 15th,16th Feb based at the Mittagong Public School with the theme 'Heroes, Heroines, Villains & Vagabonds'. Roger and Barbara Phillips have a second home in Mittagong where Barbara keeps her superb 1963 Ford Anglia. They were easily persuaded that this was a good chance to fulfill a previous offer to visit the Southern Highlands and so we duly arrived in my Bristol 408 on the Friday evening in time to attend an impromptu and fun gathering at the local golf club.

Those of you who have experience of living in England or of seeing the TV series 'Heartbeat' will recall many local Police Forces used the small Fords as daily transport. Barbara seized the chance to exploit her (Ford's) colour scheme of blue and white and Roger 'procured' suitable uniforms and had magnetic strips made up. Suitably attired off they set on the Saturday morning for the event. I took a different route to the Public School as we were not in costume and did not want to be arrested!

The cars were marshalled according to year of manufacture. We soon caught up with Chris and Irene Berry and Brian and Terry Lockwood (1976 Porsche 911) of the VSCC also from Canberra. A fellow Bristolian, Bob Dunk, arrived in his immaculate Bristol 403.

Registration accompanied a generous morning tea and a chance to view cars, re-new friendships etc while judges looked for the 'Best in Show' etc. A sit down Lunch was offered in the school hall and the prize for best in show was awarded to, I think, the beautifully presented van shown in the photo and best restoration to an Austin Healy. My choice would have been the yellow car in the photo – what is it?.

We collected our travel instructions for a lovely afternoon run which showed us areas of burnt out properties intermingled with totally untouched houses and vistas of beautiful green pastures. The area had received about 400mm of rain in the past fortnight so we saw burnt out Eucalypts with 100-200 mm shoots emerging from the trunks and herds of contented cattle and happy horses. We returned to chez Phillips and were relaxing when suddenly there was a bolt of lightning followed immediately by thunder and a torrent of rain, this continued for about 40 minutes.

The evening entertainment consisted of an excellent sit down dinner at the school after which we had prize giving and a floor show from a look (almost) alike Elvis. The Canberra representatives were sitting together and it was

good to see Chris Berry awarded one of the many 'entry number' prizes.

On Sunday we forwent the morning tea in preference for a relaxed breakfast in Roger and Barbara's lovely garden but returned to the school in time to pick up our guidance instructions for the morning run. The run took us along a well planned route with good vistas and lovely countryside. On return to Mittagong School we sat down to yet another enthusiastically prepared meal. As we had an engagement back in Canberra we left soon after meal completion so missed the final prize giving. The entry list included a category for lady drivers and I had entered the Bristol with Marie as the driver. She drove the car to the event although I took over for the scenic drives. After the lunch Marie was declared the winner of the lady drivers and, in our absence, Roger kindly went up on the stage and pretended, amongst many catcalls, to be Marie.

It was a lovely weekend and our thanks go to the Berrima District Historic Car Club for their very able organisation and enthusiastic friendship.

FORD v FERRARI

Many of us recently went to see the movie "FORD V FERRARI". Not a bad movie however it suffered from the usual Hollywood disease of exaggeration, half truths and lack of facts.

If you can get Netflix on your TV you will find a program called "24 HOUR WAR" This is an almost identical movie to FORD v FERRARI however it uses real characters instead of actors.

Both movies show how Ford tried to buy Ferrari and how Enzo got his knickers in a knot and sent Ford back to America with his tail between his legs. There was a huge sum of money offered to buy Ferrari however he lost interest when he found out that he couldn't keep his racing team.

Both movies give the impression that Ford developed the GT 40 from scratch however this is not the case. There were two men in England who were considered to be equally as good as each other in racing car construction. Colin Chapman, had Lotus, and Eric Broadly had Lola. Both men were experts in monocoque construction using sheet metal.

Both men wanted the Ford contract to build the Ferrari beater however the Lotus suffered from some form of body movement at high speed and could become unstable. Eric Broadly's Lola was therefore chosen as the car to develop. It was given the name "GT 40" because it was 40 inches high from the ground to the top of the roof.

Originally the main body, or tub as it was called, was made from aluminium however for some reason it was changed to steel and over the years most original GT 40s have suffered badly from rust.

At this time Ford moved into the Lola factory and a clash between Ford and Lola management over construction methods and time soon occurred. At this point Broadly sold his interest in the car and went about manufacturing his own Sports and Racing cars. These were lightweight chassis with large American engines. They were very successful and there are still many of them around running in Historic racing meetings.

From here on the movies are pretty factual as the development shown did take place. At first the Ford did not have the speed then it did not handle at high speed and then there were the brakes. Their solution to the brake problem was very clever.

I once saw in a motor magazine a graph of speeds down the Mulsanne straight. It showed the Ferraris touching just over 220 mph and in the middle of the graph was a line starting from nowhere and running off the graph at the side. This was supposed to be the Ford passing the Ferraris.

Both movies brought back many memories to me of racing back in the 50s and 60s and although Stirling Moss was the only star that I ever saw, down in Melbourne at the 1956 Olympic Grand Prix, the others read like a roll call. It was rumoured that A.J.
