General meetings procedure during COVID-19 emergency

In 2020, amendments were made to the Associations Incorporation Act 1991 (the Act) to allow incorporated associations to continue to hold general meetings during COVID-19.

Section 70AA of the Act provides that the committee of an incorporated association may, during COVID-19, authorise general meetings to be held via methods of communication other than in person. This was previously only available to associations that made provision for meetings via alternative communication methods in their rules. This amendment was due to end on 8 October 2021, however, in anticipation of further amendments to the Act later in the year that will be applied retrospectively, associations will be able to continue to use alternative communication methods to hold general meetings.

Confirming some points we discussed today:

- Committee decided on 7 Sept 2021 that the AGM would be held on the date of our regular November meeting 9 Nov.

Alec Issigonis, the maverick genius behind the original Mini, is supposed to have said to Tom French, Dunlop's chief designer "Give me wheels this size." French took a ruler and measured the space between Issigonis's outstretched hands. it was 10 inches (25cm) Whether true or not, Dunlop went on to make the specially sized wheels and tyres, unique to the Mini, as part of Issigonis's fastidious packaging requirements for the little car, they made for smaller wheel arches, which robbed less space from the interior. 'Ordinary 12- inch (30cm) tyres were standardized across the range in 1984.

THE CARS THAT I HAVE OWNED

Over the years I have asked many people, 'what car have you owned that you would like back in your garage?' It brings some interesting responses and it's not always the car that is worth the most money today.

I am now asking that question to myself so I have tried to remember all the cars that I have owned. The following only takes into account family or hobby cars as there have been many others that were just passing through my hands. Regretfully some that would be quite valuable today.

I bought my first car at 16 years of age – a 1951 Ford Anglia. It didn't even make it home from Braddon to Red Hill but I fixed that.

Next one was a 1959 Morris 1000 but someone T boned me near Red Hill Primary School and wrote it off. Not to be deterred I bought a straight Morrie Lowlight body from a wrecker and transferred all the running gear. I owned this for years and it was a great car. In some ways I wish I had it now. Then I found a 1952 Morris Minor in Sydney that had a professionally fitted MGB engine. Could not let that go so it became my rather fast daily driver for a while

Over the next few years I owned a series of Austin Healey Sprites, more Morris Minors and then a Morris 1100. Nice car but too slow so I fitted Cooper S running gear. Much nicer.

We bought a 1966 Holden HR Panel Van and with a little caravan travelled around Australia in 1971. Came across so many 1920/30's cars that were (and still are) my real interest. There will be more to follow on this.

Then came a real gem - 1973 Triumph 2.5 Estate Wagon. Bought it from a guy at the British Embassy. It had power steering - a real bonus. Over our many years of ownership I added overdrive and air conditioning. A truly lovely drivers car and I wonder where it is now.

We then moved into the family, hobby and my (work) cars. The Triumph was the family car but I needed a ute for my work. Don't know why but Holdens were my choice so I owned a string of them EH, HR, HT, HG, HQ, and lastly an HX. I recorded over 250,000klm in that HX and only sold it 4 years ago. Could not kill it.

Many of these cars that I have owned needed some work and if the price was right I was up for that. The HR ute was one that I rebuilt from a good basis. Repainted it in bright red and fitted it with X2 running gear and a 4 speed gearbox. Great car and never failed us. Where is it now?

During this time so many cars came my way – a 1968 MG Midget that was Helen's daily driver for years and a string of Mini Cooper 'S's, HT Monaro, HT Premier Wagon, HQ Monaro, and many more that I cant remember.

Our journey in 1971 led to finding the remains of a 1926 Overland Whippet so I bought it for \$15. Finally completed the restoration in 1984 and entered it in the 1988 Bicentennial Rally. It made the top 20 into the judging ring. Enjoyed it for the next 15 years then someone came along and wanted to buy it. I would like to know where it is now. Since then a 1925 Buick, 1915 T Model Ford and a 1932 Chrysler Imperial have entered my world but the focus is on a 1932 Ford Sedan that takes pride of place in my workshop right now.

A 1932 'B' Model Phaeton Ford was another one that entered my workshop for a while. Found in outer Melbourne and it had been shedded for over 40 years so for a period I had two 1932 Fords in my possession. For a teenager who had a passion for 1932 Fords, how good could this get but I had to make a decision as to which one would win me over. The Sedan won but thankfully the Phaeton is now in the hands of a very experienced enthusiast in Quean-beyan.

There is one vehicle which wins the 'longest time I have owned it' prize, (that is continually registered) and it's our 1993 Chev Silverado Diesel pickup. We bought it in Hollywood in 1999, fitted a slide on camper and toured America, Canada, Alaska and back to LA over a 3 month period. It has been to within 200 miles of the Arctic Circle and all the way to the Mexican border. Found it so much better than pulling a caravan so imported it back to Oz and had it converted to right hand drive. It has been fully registered ever since and has done many trips around our east coast. It's a useful tow truck when the camper is taken off but we can also tow a boat or little 4WD behind it with camper on so extremely versatile we reckon. Gosh it will be classed as a historic vehicle in 2 years.

And the car that I most want back is that red HR ute. It towed boats, caravans, classic cars and more. I started to look for it over 20 years ago but no luck, so I bought a project WB ute and it has been a complete rebuild. Its back on its wheels now and red of course!

But I would love to know where that HR ute is now. YBY986 if you can tell me.


