CLUB MEMBERS' VEHICLES

Greg Barber's 1960 Ford Ranchero

This 1960 Ford Falcon Ranchero is my first foray into classic car ownership, and it came about somewhat accidentally. I had decided a couple of years ago that I wanted to buy a classic car, but I wasn't specifically looking to buy a Ranchero. I had been spending a ridiculous amount of time trawling various auction and car sales website

sites trying to determine what classic car I wanted. I was researching a wide range of vehicles. I don't have a strong brand loyalty to either Ford or Holden, and a quick look through my saved cars on carsales or facebook market place brings up VWs, Fiats, Volvos, SAABs, BMWs, Datsuns, Land Rovers, MGs, Leyland P76s, Studebakers and even a Tatra 603 (a beautiful car).

Finally I saw a green 1960 Ford Ranchero (Australia's equivalent is the XK Ford Falcon Ute) at a Shannons Auction in Melbourne



being sold without a reserve. I wasn't really after a left hand drive car or a car with auto transmission, however there had a been a green XK ute on our family farm when I was growing up and so this green Ranchero must have plucked at some deeply hidden memories.

I had seen a left hand drive vehicle go cheaply at an auction about 6 weeks before this Shannons auction and with the Ranchero being sold without reserve I thought it might go cheaply too, so I decided to bid, despite not having viewed the vehicle in person. I watched the auction online for a while, and then on the last day put in my maximum bid that I didn't really think would be sucessful and walked away from all devices for the rest of the night so that I didn't get caught up in auction excitement and chase the bidding higher than I wanted to.

I awoke the next morning a bit surprised to find that I owned a Ranchero. Then I set about sorting out the logistics of getting it to Canberra, sorting out insurance and rego etc. The transport company picked up the ute from Shannons within a day or two but then faffed about for around a month before getting it on a truck to Canberra. Not having seen the vehicle in the flesh before buying it I was keen to see if it matched the photos. The auction houses do a pretty good job of taking photos that portray the vehicles in a good light so I didn't expect it to be as good as the photos. Surprisingly it was just as good as the photos, and even passed rego at the government inspection station at Hume without any issues. Six weeks after the auction it was registered and on the road.

The Ranchero drives exactly as you would expect for a vehicle that is over 60 years old. Vague steering, ordinary brakes, soft suspension and poor fuel consumption but lots of smiles from the driver. So far I'm driving at least once a week and its getting a fair bit of attention every time I take it out, and I'm not spending too much time working on it.

What exactly is a Ford Falcon Ranchero? It is a ute version of the Ford Falcon, a smaller Ford introduced in the US to meet demand for a smaller family car and in Australia to compete again the home grown Holdens.

This vehicle is one of the early models of the 2nd generation of Ranchero, the earlier and later generations of Rancheros are based on larger model Fairlanes. There are a few physical differences between the US made Ranchero and the Australian made Falcon utes of the same era (XK, XL, XM & XP). The Ranchero has longer doors and more space behind the seats which is where the spare wheel is located. The Falcon uses that space as tray/tub space with the spare wheel located behind the number plate under the tray/tub. The Ranchero came with chrome trim around the top lip of the rear tub and across the rear edge of the cabin, and the B pillar is narrower and the rear window is vertical. The Falcons got a more decorative and wider B pillar, and the rear window is at an angle.

The Ranchero tray/tub was extended to keep a tub length of 6 feet resulting in a longer overhang than the Falcon's behind the rear axle. The Ranchero also has a full chrome rear bumper bar whilst Falcons either had no bumpers or small corner bumper bars. The Falcon fuel filler is closer to the cabin whilst the Ranchero's is located behind the rear wheel at the rear of the tray/tub. There may also be other things I haven't worked out yet.



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My Ranchero was manufactured on 24 March 1960 at San Jose, California. It was fitted with a 144 cubic inch (90hp, 2.2 litre) in-line 6, and a 3 speed (3 on the tree)

manual transmission. Original colours were Corinthian White roof with a Monte Carlo Red body. Black and white vinyl interior.

The vehicle has undergone a restoration whilst in the USA with installation of a 200 cubic inch (120hp, 3.3 litre) in-line 6 with a 3-speed automatic transmission, and the paintwork changed to the metallic green as you see it today. New black vinyl upholstery was installed, along with tinted windows, a liner for the tray/tub and lowered suspension to complete the package.

This vehicle was imported to Melbourne following purchase (by another owner) at the

frik te

August 2018 Mecum Auction in Monterey California. It was very lightly used for 5 years before being purchased by me at the Shannon's winter auction in August 2023. The vehicle is now registered on the historic rego scheme in Canberra and driven weekly



From Red Hill summit parking area: follow Red Hill Drive down to the roundabout. Turn **RIGHT** along Mugga Way Turn **LEFT** down Flinders Wav Turn LEFT at Franklin Street. Manuka. Turn **RIGHT** at Furneaux Street Turn LEFT at Canberra Avenue. Turn LEFT at State Circle Turn **RIGHT** at Melbourne Avenue Turn **RIGHT** at Parliament Drive Turn **RIGHT** at Federation Mall, then immediately **LEFT** to cross to the Northbound lane of Federation Mall Turn **RIGHT** to proceed north on Federation Mall Turn **RIGHT** at Queen Victoria Terrace Continue LEFTWARD around Walpole Crescent then LEFT along King Edward Terrace, across the front of Old Parliament House Turn **RIGHT** at Parkes Place West and continue all the way to the lakefront between Questicon and the National Library Turn **RIGHT** along Queen Elizabeth Terrace across the lakefront, then up Parkes Place East past the National Gallery Turn LEFT at King Edward Terrace and continue through the roundabout to the sliproad onto Kings Avenue Turn **LEFT** onto Parkes Way Turn **RIGHT** at next roundabout onto Anzac Parade Turn LEFT onto Limestone Avenue Turn LEFT at Girrahween Street towards Braddon Turn LEFT at Lonsdale Street Through Braddon, cross Cooyong Street and continue straight down Genge Street Turn LEFT at Bunda Street and continue through shared zone Continue **STRAIGHT** into Allara Street and past the Casino Turn **RIGHT** at Constitution Avenue Turn LEFT at Vernon Circle and continue onto Commonwealth Avenue Across Commonwealth Avenue Bridge, take LEFT sliproad cloverleaf to Flynn Drive. Follow Flynn Drive past Lennox Gardens. Turn **RIGHT** at roundabout. into Alexandrina Drive Turn **RIGHT** at Banks Street into Weston Park Turn LEFT at Robert Boden Drive toward Yarralumla Nursery and The Oaks Brasserie.

A field of classic Ford Cortinas, one of Australia's legendary cars, will race it out at 47th Historic Winton on Saturday 25th May.

The race is a collaboration between Historic Winton, the Historic Touring Car Association of Victoria (HTCV) and Cortina Mk 1 Owners Club.

Secretary of the HTCV Jim Collins said that the Mk1 Cortina has been one of the most popular cars racing in Historic Touring Cars since it was first released in 1963.

"How better to celebrate the 60 plus years of competition than to have a "Cortina Challenge" feature race on the short track at the Historic Winton meeting where numerous drivers would have had their first experience of historic racing," Jim said. "The challenge is open to all Mk1 Cortina Group Nb and Nc class log booked competition vehicles."

He said that after promoting the concept of the "Cortina Challenge" to various Mk1 Cortina drivers they think it is a great idea and they are all looking forward to the event and especially their own feature race.

"The Winton short circuit used for Historic Winton has always been considered ideal for the Cortina. The drivers will be checking that they will have the right diff ratio for their car and brakes are in excellent working order before the event," Jim said.

Like the previous Mini Dash, Historic Winton introduced special 'type-only' races onto the program a couple of years ago.

Historic Winton race secretary, Peta Lee said that Cortinas have always been uncompromising competitors in the Group N touring car races against all sorts of hard-top cars, big and small.

"Spectators enjoy seeing much beloved, former everyday vehicles race and it draws quite a crowd," Peta Lee said. "Cortinas were a small, family car that was Ford's competitor to the Holden Torana.

"In fact, there have been some edge-of-your-seat moments in the past in the Group N events, with Minis and Cortinas entering into close battle, so it will be interesting to see just how competitive Cortina against Cortina becomes."

The 47th Historic Winton, Australia's longest running and most popular historic car and motorcycle race event, will be held on 25th and 26th May 2024 at Winton Motor Raceway, near Benalla.



Survey reveals Australia's historic vehicle owners spend over \$9.9 billion annually

- Over 6,000 respondents across 800 motoring clubs in a nationwide Economic Value Study confirm close to \$10 billion in annual expenditure on historic vehicles
- An estimated 970,000 historic vehicles in Australia with owners spending close to \$10,240 per vehicle per year
- Australian Motor Heritage Foundation: "In carrying out this study, we have shown that the historic vehicle movement is a large and vibrant part of Australia's society and economy"

Sydney, 11th April, 2024 - The owners of Australia's historic vehicles spend some \$9.9 billion each year on their passion, according to a new survey.

The Economic Value Study (EVS) of well over 6000 Australian respondents, distributed to over 800 motoring clubs nationally, was conducted for the Australian Motor Heritage Foundation (AMHF) by The Mercurius Group (TMG). The Foundation is champions of Australia's motor heritage, and an organisation dedicated to promoting and preserving Australia's motoring history.

The enthusiast owners of an estimated 970,000 historic vehicles in Australia spend on average \$10,240 per vehicle annually, around 12.5% more than people who own daily driven cars. The historic vehicle fleet represents 4.4% of Australia's 21 million total vehicle fleet. Around 50% of the survey respondents own only one historic vehicle, the other 50% owning two or more vehicles. "Historic" vehicles are in two categories: those 15 to 30 years old defined as "classic" vehicles and those over 30 years old defined as "heritage" vehicles.

The survey also reveals the total annual economic impact, including both direct and indirect expenditure, is \$25.2 billion: with the sector creating almost 79,000 jobs - 42,000 direct and 37,000 indirect. These jobs generate \$6.2 billion in wages and salaries annually. These are very large numbers by any standard.




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


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
