

London Taxi to be feature of Terribly British Day

A 1971 Austin London taxi will be a feature of the 2010 Terribly British Day on the Patrick White lawns on 5 December.

Terribly British Day chairman Paul Sutton, said he was delighted that the black taxi cab was being made available for the display day by Stuart Saunders owner of the Binalong Motor Museum



'The taxi is a runner and will travel under its own power to the Display area,' Mr Sutton said.

The 2.3 litre diesel powered vehicle was manufactured in Birmingham. The design was popular with taxi drivers because of its very tight steering lock, its spacious rear seat compartment with fold-down seats for extra passengers and a sliding screen divider which separates passengers from the driver.

Brought to Australia in the mid 1970s the taxi was used privately until it was donated to the Binalong Motor Museum.

Mr Sutton said this years Terribly British Day is expected to be the biggest ever with more than 350 vehicles on display including three fire appliances from the Fire Brigade Historical Society of the ACT fleet and most British made vehicles from Austin to Zephyr on display.

Terribly British Day is organised by the Jaguar Drivers Club in association with the British car and motor cycle clubs in the Canberra Region and is supported by the NRMA Veteran, Vintage and Classic Insurance

NOTES FROM A COACHBUILDERS WORKBOOK

Where plywood may have been originally used in this area, instead of loose boards, unless it is near perfect condition (very unlikely) it is best to replace it entirely. Usually by this stage some moisture will have inevitably found its way along and into the edges of the layers, and they will have begun to delaminate. Replace with marine grade plywood as a matter of course. The 'exterior' and 'water resistant' grades, though cheaper, are not an option, in my opinion.

Doors are nearly always an item needing repair, being subjected to considerable wear and tear in simply being opened and closed, if nothing else. However the bottom rail is particularly vulnerable as any moisture or rain inevitably finds its way down inside the door, to lay on top of the rail there at the bottom, with disastrous results. In a full height saloon with opening windows in the doors it is also highly likely that the window mechanism has also been attacked by moisture, so completely dismantling the doors is always recommended.

As well, if all that were not enough, in most cases the hinge screws, in both the door and frame, are likely to be loose. So there are lots of opportunities for repair work on and around doors. But... never make a start on any door until *all* the main framework is fully completed to your entire satisfaction, and the car is sitting on its own wheels and suspension. To successfully work on car doors the floor on which the car is standing should be as near flat and level as possible. Trying to fit doors into bodywork that may be slightly twisted is an exercise in frustration.

Because it is so easy to become confused with the four doors all having very similarly shaped bits and pieces, always take off the hardware - hinges, locks, catches, handles etc - from just one door at a time and keep each set completely separate. Although they may all look identical, this is actually highly unlikely. Then carefully remove the


inner lining, which will probably be a section of fabric or perhaps leather glued or pinned to a board, and lastly very carefully remove the outer metal panelling.

The best way to remove all of the tiny tacks holding the metal on is with an upholsterers nail lifter, sometimes called a 'cats paw'. Slip it under the metal (not the nail head) and lift the metal up a fraction, together with the nail, of course. Then ease the metal back down slightly which will leave the nail head standing a bit proud and easy to remove. It is a painstaking job. Once all the nails are out the metal panelling can then be carefully eased off the timberwork. Very often this metal panel itself will be rusty around or at the bottom and will also need repair – but that is well beyond the scope of this article..

This will expose the wooden door framework, which is not always a pretty sight. Now remove any door window winder mechanism and place this with the other parts from this door. If you work on one door at a time you will always have the opposite paired door to refer to when replacing the original parts and mechanisms. If not, do be sure to take plenty of good, close up, photographs during dismantling, for these will be more than useful later.

As the old glue and screws will probably be loose, allowing the door framework to flex and move, easily proven by picking it up and gently twisting it in your hands, all the joints will need taking apart and cleaning. Again careful removal of all the screws should allow the joints to be separated, though they may need some careful easing.


When working with any door – either an old one, as here, or a brand new one being built – the first piece to be fitted is always the bottom rail. If the existing piece is in good enough to re-use, which in fact is somewhat unlikely, there are a few tricks which can be incorporated to improve this piece. The starting point is not the door rail itself, but the bottom rail of the door frame. The following drawings should illustrate the various requirements and techniques. The top face of this rail should always slope downwards towards the outside, to allow any water to drain down outside the car. This is true whether it is rebated or not. See Dwg. 4. In addition, due to capillarity (the ability of water to climb up through small spaces), there should be a small groove worked into the rebated section – Dwg 5. This effectively stops water finding its way inside the car at this point. So the first steps should be to provide this angled top face to the rail, and where rebated, to provide the groove.




Dwg 4. DOOR BOTTOM RAIL

It was quite common not to fit a rebate on the bottom rail - cheaper, easier, faster, for a start - but it was also found that the 'step' became somewhat inconvenient at times, causing people to trip as they entered the car. As a sort of bonus, bodybuilders also often used this flat surface to fix their company's trade name plate too. In this situation the capillary groove should be cut into the underside of the door bottom rail - see drawing 5. Now for the door bottom rail itself.

To accommodate the revised angled top of the door frame it will be necessary to firstly plane off a small section from the bottom face of this rail, then glue a slightly larger new section back on. Dwg. 6. It should go without saying that here it is essential to use first class







Dug 5. CAPILLERY CIRCOVES.

quality marine grade glue. Once the glue has dried the bottom face will need to be fitted to the revised bottom door rail, of course. Once all that has been accomplished satisfactorily, then stainless steel screws can be fitted to securely hold the new timber in place. Or a completely new bottom door rail may need to be fabricated if the original is too poor to re-use.

The next step is to also slope or angle the top face of this rail, again to allow any rainwater finding its way inside the door to leak down and outside. Dwg. 7. Copyright © 2010 Peter Rhys-Davies.

There was (almost) every make and model on display. Cars dating from Vintage to brand new. Including a Walkinshaw supercharged VE Commodore (nice)

There were displays from a number of car clubs but most of the cars just parked in rows across the sports ground. There were that cars showed their age, and cars that had been lovingly restored. There were cars that were original and cars that were modified.

I then checked with the park owners as to where the nearest pub was and I walked across to see if they had a TV (yes) and was the rugby league on at 5:00 (yes) and did they do evening meals (yes). "Good" I said, "I'll be back at 5:00".

At 5:00 Anne and I walked to the pub. Anne got her drink and settled into the beer garden with her book, and I settled into the main bar with the TV and regulars. Since I was one of the few who knew the rules and was able to explain them to the locals (remember we were in Victoria) I became a favoured son of the town.

After the footy Anne and I had an excellent pub cooked meal and Anne was able to order her favourite – lamb shanks.

After tea we wandered back to the van park. Had an early night and woke up late Monday morning. We left the park at about 10 am and headed home. Fuel at Albury, lunch and fuel Gundagai and a leisurely cruise up the Hume highway.

My thoughts - An excellent car show worth going to. It's a long drive so it would have to be a long weekend, or part of a rally. It's certainly too far for a day trip.

Because of the range of cars that were at the show this makes it rather a unique display. Summernats has lots of horsepower, NRMA Motorfest has Veteran, Vintage and Classic, Wheels has club specific, Euroa has everything old and new.
